(1) **City Initiative:**

**OFFICIAL COMMUNITY PLAN BYLAW, 1995, AMENDMENT BYLAW (NO. 41) - No. 02-19:**

To amend the Official Community Plan Bylaw by adding Development Permit Area 32, Menzies Street James Bay Neighbourhood. The purpose of the Development Permit Area is to establish development permits and guidelines for regulating the form and character of buildings in the area along Menzies Street from Simcoe to Superior Streets. The establishment of this Development Permit Area will recognize and revitalize the village centre of the James Bay neighbourhood and assure a high quality of development when change occurs.

**DEVELOPMENT VARIANCE PERMIT**

1. **DEVELOPMENT VARIANCE PERMIT APPLICATION NO. 02-04 FOR PROPERTY known as 1964 Fairfield Road (Abkhazi Garden):**

This is an application to relax the parking standard for the Abkhazi Garden's commercial exhibit use. A total of 28 spaces are required under the Zoning Bylaw based on the 6460m<sup>2</sup> area of land covered by the gardens. The applicant is requesting the required on-site parking be reduced to a total of 8 spaces with 5 spaces on the Fairfield Road property and 3 other spaces on the adjacent Foul Bay Road property.

**CORRESPONDENCE:**

Thirty eight (38) completed survey forms were received regarding the application.

One (1) letter was received supporting the application.

One (1) letter was received objecting to the application.

**PRESENTATIONS:**

**Mr. Bill Turner, 5793 Old West Saanich Road (The Land Conservancy):** advised of the purchase of this property by The Land Conservancy two (2) years ago on behalf of the community and the Fairfield Community Association. Volunteers have worked hard to restore this property in order to open it to the public. A parking management study has been conducted to support this application. The Land Conservancy will continue to work with the community to resolve any parking issues. Innovative incentives are being considered to reduce parking demands, such as providing bike racks and discounts at the Garden for non motorized transportation.

**Mr. David Harper (Westland Resource Group):** advised that his firm conducted the parking management study. The study supports this application. Tours and alternative modes of transportation are being encouraged to reduce parking demands. BC Transit is being requested to improve service to this area. Information is being communicated to visitors regarding parking option. An undertaking has been concluded with Margaret Jenkins School for use their parking lot. A copy of the agreement will be forwarded to the city when it has been executed.

**Mr. Farquhar, 1913 Shotbolt Road:** express support for the application and appreciation for the consultation of the proponents.

It was moved by Councillor Madoff, seconded by Councillor Fleming, that Council authorizes the issuance of a Development Variance Permit for 1964 Fairfield Road (Abkhazi Garden) in accordance with:

- (a) Plans stamped "Development Variance Permit Application #02-04" dated March 14, 2002 and the implementation by The Land Conservancy of the Abkhazi Garden Parking Management Plan dated January 2002.
- (b) Development meeting all bylaw requirements with the following variances:
  - Schedule C, Section 16 C 9(b): Relaxation of required parking for commercial exhibit use from 1 space per 232m<sup>2</sup> (28 stalls) of lot area to one space per 807m<sup>2</sup> (8 stalls) for visitor parking.
- (c) Parking and access plan to the satisfaction of the Director of Engineering; and
- (d) Final plans in accordance with plans identified above to the satisfaction of the Director of Planning and Development.

**HEARINGS – REQUESTS TO ADDRESS COUNCIL**

Councillor Lunt voted against the motion.

1. **Doug Hill – Re: BC Hydro**

Mr. Hill requested Council's support of the Office & Professional Employees' International Union's, Local 378, workers for BC Hydro initiative "Don't Sell BC Hydro" and to send a strong message of support to the Provincial Government.

It was moved by Councillor Madoff, seconded by Councillor Fleming, that the request from the Office & Professional Employees' International Union, Local 378, workers for BC Hydro, to support their initiative "Don't Sell BC Hydro", be referred to the next Committee of the Whole.

2. Hennie Stibbe – Re: Popcorn Tree

Ms. Stibbe inquired as to when staff will replace the tree, which died in front of Capital 6 by popcorn oil being poured onto the sidewalk and into the drain, as the city has now received money as compensation from Capital 6.

3. Leon "Ted" Smith – Re: Operating License of Ted's Books

Mr. Smith requested an opportunity to make a presentation before Committee of the Whole in respect to decriminalizing the sale of marijuana, by changing the federal laws to make enforcement of the sale of marijuana the lowest priority. Members of the Cannabis Buyers Club would like to have a public meeting with representatives of Health Canada. The Cannabis Buyers Club needs to be secured in its current location.

It was moved by Councillor Fleming, seconded by Councillor Madoff, that the following motion be referred to the next Committee of the Whole meeting for discussion and that representatives of Health Canada be invited to attend a future Committee of the Whole meeting:

Victoria City Council express its support for the decriminalization of marijuana (cannabis) use and possession, particularly for medicinal purposes, in Canada and request that the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) undertake efforts to influence the federal government to amend or repeal applicable laws.

4. Donna Ohs – Re: Operating License of Ted's Books

Ms. Ohs expressed support for the continued business operation of Ted's Books. People need cannabis for the relief of pain. Ted's Books provides a safe place to purchase marijuana. Cannabis is not addictive. Council should direct the Victoria Police Department to consider the enforcement of cannabis possession laws to be the lowest priority.

5. Delton Woolcock – Re: Operating License of Ted's Books

Mr. Woolcock submitted information on marijuana from Health Canada's web site. The federal government considers the sale of marijuana for medicinal purposes as a health issue. The enforcement against the sale of marijuana is considered a police issue.

6. Ted Hawryluk – Re: Operating License of Ted's Books

Mr. Hawryluk requested Council to direct the Victoria Police Department to consider the enforcement of cannabis possession laws to be the lowest priority. The police can use their discretion when enforcing laws.

7. Elizabeth Core – Re: Operating License of Ted's Books

Ms. Core advised of her need for marijuana for pain relief. The police should use their discretion when enforcing cannabis possession laws. The Cannabis Buyers Club should be granted a business license.

8. Ryan Schakold – Re: Operating License of Ted's Books

Mr. Schakold advised of his need for marijuana for pain relief. The Cannabis Buyers Club provides a safe place to purchase marijuana.

9. Tavis Dodds – Re: Operating License of Ted's Books

Mr. Dodds suggested that the police should use their discretion when enforcing cannabis possession laws. Marijuana is a religious rite.

**Councillors Fleming and Vanden Berg excused themselves from the Council Chambers at 8:55 PM.**

10. Denis Oliver – Re: Council Meeting Agendas Advertised

Mr. Oliver requested that the Times-Colonist Municipal Update provide more information regarding Council meetings.

11. David Johnston – Re: Public Governing Bodies

Mr. Johnston stated that it is the responsibility of the government to provide total exclusivity. If you do not know humility you cannot know what it is to be mature. Righteousness is for everyone.

**Councillors Fleming and Vanden Berg returned to the Council Chambers at 8:59 PM.**

12. Colleen Matte – Re: Operating License of Ted's Books

Ms. Matte expressed support for the business operation of the Cannabis Buyers Club in its current location. The Cannabis Buyers Club provides a safe place to purchase marijuana. No minors are permitted. Identification is required when entering the facility and again when purchasing anything. Marijuana helps people with medical problems.

13. Richard Whitwell – Re: Operating License of Ted's Books

Mr. Whitwell advised of his need for marijuana for pain relief. The Cannabis Buyers Club provides an invaluable service to the disabled. Draconian laws reflect prejudices. Human rights need to be discussed. Many peoples lives rely on it. Education is the way to eliminate discrimination. Ignorance and intolerance need to be eliminated.

14. Marie-Josée Willson – Re: Operating License of Ted's Books

Ms. Willson stated that we are all equals. Supporters of the Cannabis Buyers Club represent a community for people who want a better tomorrow. A cultural society should be supported.

### REPORTS OF THE COMMITTEE

#### COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE – March 21, 2002

1. ANTI-FIGHTING BYLAW INITIATIVE. It was moved by Councillor McLean, seconded by Councillor Hughes, that Council instruct the City Solicitor to prepare a draft bylaw to deal with the matters, as set out in Constable Gill's report. Carried

#### COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE – March 28, 2002

1. TOURISM VICTORIA. It was moved by Councillor Hughes, seconded by Councillor Madoff, that Council approve the request for proceeds of the 2002, 2% Hotel Tax to be used for external marketing of the destination and be distributed as follows:
1. \$475,040 (based on 1% of 2001 CPI) to the Victoria Conference Centre for marketing and promotion of the Victoria Conference Centre; and
  2. Balance of the 2% Hotel Tax to the Destination Marketing Commission for executing the 2002 Marketing Plan. Carried
2. BELFRY THEATRE. It was moved by Hughes, seconded by Councillor Madoff, that Council provide Belfry Theatre with their grant request of \$19,300.00 from the capital grant funding. Carried
3. SOCIAL SERVICES OPERATING GRANTS. It was moved by Councillor Hughes, seconded by Councillor Madoff, that the City of Victoria provide its \$34,738.00 share of the 2002 Social Services Operating Grant request. Carried
4. DALLAS ROAD WALK. It was moved by Councillor Hughes, seconded by Councillor Madoff, that Council direct staff to proceed with replacement of the Dallas Road Walkway using asphalt as a surface material with a width of 2.3 metres (7.5 feet). Carried
5. ROSS BAY CEMETERY. It was moved by Councillor Hughes, seconded by Councillor Madoff, that
1. Council authorizes staff to provide assurance to the Old Cemeteries Society of Victoria that the funds generated from the resale of plots in Ross Bay Cemetery would be used for the benefit of the operation and upgrade of Ross Bay Cemetery.
  2. Council requests that the Board of Cemetery Trustees of Greater Victoria provide assistance to the City of Victoria in developing a business plan for this project.
  3. Council authorizes staff to negotiate with the Board of Cemetery Trustees of Greater Victoria, subject to Council approval, the role of the Board in implementing this project. Carried
6. BUDGET, 2002 – 2006 FINANCIAL PLAN. It was moved by Councillor Hughes, seconded by Councillor Madoff, that
1. Council approve the 5-Year Operating Budget Financial Plan as submitted;
  2. Council approve the 5-Year Capital Budget Financial Plan as submitted;
  2. Council approve the 2002 tax increase of 3.96%;
  3. Council approve the recommendation to adjust the tax ratios to evenly distribute the tax increase to all Property Tax Classes, except Utility; and that
  4. Council approve the Capital Budget Funding Strategies. Carried

7. **BUDGET - INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS.** It was moved by Councillor Hughes, seconded by Councillor Madoff, that
1. Item No. 1 - "Performing Arts Facility" be removed from the Infrastructure Projects list; and that
  2. The remainder of the 20 projects on the Infrastructure Projects list be moved up one place, so that the first three projects listed in the order of priority would be:
    - (i) Victoria Harbour Environment Projection Program
    - (ii) Storm Sewer Main Rehabilitation Program
    - (iii) Burnside Gorge Community Place
- Carried
8. **LEGAL – OPERATING AGREEMENT.** It was moved by Councillor Hughes, seconded by Councillor Madoff, that Council approve the Northwest Trunk Operating Agreement. Carried
9. **LEGAL – LEASE.** It was moved by Councillor Hughes, seconded by Councillor Madoff, that Council approve an amendment of the existing lease for Unit 14, Centennial Square, extending the term by two years until September 30, 2004. All other terms and conditions of the existing lease remain unchanged. Carried

**COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE – April 4, 2002**

1. **KYOTO PROTOCOL.** It was moved by Councillor Lunt, seconded by Councillor Madoff, that Council adopt the following resolution:
- WHEREAS:** climate change causes drought, permafrost melting, sea-level to rise, and floods that damage municipal infrastructure, displace citizens, and create a financial burden for municipal governments;
- WHEREAS:** economic activity in rural and northern communities relying on fisheries, tourism, forestry, and agriculture is disrupted by climate change;
- WHEREAS:** investments in building retrofits, community energy systems, water, conservation, renewable energy technologies, waste reduction, landfill gas capture, fleet management and public transit reduce municipal operating costs, help maintain community services, and protect public health while cutting greenhouse gas emissions contributing to climate change;
- WHEREAS:** forestry and agriculture sectors can expand business opportunities by increasing the capacity of trees and soils to absorb carbon dioxide and by developing renewable fuels like ethanol;
- WHEREAS:** fossil fuel producers are increasing investments in renewable energy and alternative fossil fuel technologies that reduce the amount of carbon dioxide going into the air; and
- WHEREAS:** 72 percent of Canadians want the Kyoto Protocol ratified;
- BE IT RESOLVED THAT:** Council for The Corporation of the City of Victoria endorses ratification of the Kyoto Protocol; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT:** this resolution be communicated to our Member of Parliament, provincial environment and energy ministers, federal and provincial opposition leaders, community media and the Federation of Canadian Municipalities. Carried
2. **LEGAL – JAMES BAY COMMUNITY LIBRARY.** It was moved by Councillor Lunt, seconded by Councillor Madoff, that the Agreement between the Greater Victoria Public Library, the City of Victoria and the James Bay Health & Community Services for the provision of the James Bay Community Library be renewed for a one-year term. Carried

**Councillor Lunt left the meeting at 9:10 PM.**

3. **FUTURE OF PUBLIC INSURANCE – NOTICE OF MOTION.** It was moved by Councillor Fleming, seconded by Councillor Madoff, that Council adopt the following resolution:
- WHEREAS:** The Insurance Corporation was founded in 1973 as a direct result of the Wooten Royal Commission that investigated shoddy practices of private insurance companies, and;
- WHEREAS:** The Insurance Corporation is mandated to provide fair rating which does not discriminate on the basis of age, gender, marital status nor postal code, and;
- WHEREAS:** Statistics show that over 99% of all motorists carry valid insurance in British Columbia, unlike other jurisdictions where the incidence of uninsured motorists are as high as 30%; and
- WHEREAS:** The Insurance Corporation contributes \$60 million per year on road safety initiatives which is 30 times more than all private Insurance Carriers combined in the Province of Ontario; and
- WHEREAS:** Safer roads make our communities better places to live, and:
- WHEREAS:** The Insurance Corporation provides over 6000 direct jobs and many more in supporting business including, independent brokers, auto body shops, glass shops and others;

**THEREFORE LET IT BE RESOLVED:** that Victoria City Council call upon the local Members of the Legislative Assembly, the Minister responsible for the Insurance Corporation of British Columbia, and the Premier of the Province of British Columbia to preserve universal public auto insurance, which does not discriminate, which decreased uninsured motorists, and which provides for road safety initiatives that benefit our City. Carried

**WHEREAS:** effective September 2002, Legal Aid will cut 74% of its staff and start denying service to over 8,000 residents in the region as a result of these cuts;

**WHEREAS:** the worst hit is family law. Most Legal Aid family law files involve women and children often times victims of domestic abuse;

**WHEREAS:** the result of these cuts will leave Victoria residents who are poor, disadvantaged and disproportionately female without legal representation;

**THEREFORE:** the City of Victoria wishes for the Province of British Columbia to recognize Legal Aid as a local necessity;

**BE IT RESOLVED THAT:** the City of Victoria demands the Attorney General protect public interest in the area of justice, immediately restore funds to Legal Aid and allocate 100% of the revenue received from the special tax on legal services and from the federal government to the provision of legal aid;

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT:** copies of this resolution be sent to the Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM) and MLA’s Jeff Bray and Sheila Orr. Carried
