- Garbage cans left till Monday on waterfront

- More native plantings in parks
- More crosswalk access to parks
- More tourist signage – create conduits of parks between Ogden Point and BHP.
- More space for young people 10 – 35 years of age
- More community garden plots (retain ones we have)
- Untended, wild, accessible to everyone park space
- All the roof tops of the high rises need to be safe, public view spaces and green spaces
- Clear roadways to cycle along
- More mowing of grass in public parks and street boulevards
- Snow and ice removal promptly from around park streets. (I.e. Irving Park at Michigan and Menzies not cleared for a week.
- More festival and celebration space
- Nicer entrance to cruise ships and clipper and Coho
- Water parks for children to stomp in
- A spot to put the Emily Carr statue
- A sculpture park so donated stuff can be looked after
- Using the land / water perimeter for public activities

Future Needs:

- Green space is more important due to increased density
- Define and protect green space
- Aging population therefore more benches, better pathways, more policing more washrooms.
- More benches
- Increase scooter traffic
- More biking opportunities
- Preservation of natural ecosystems
- Fall all generations – keep inter generational (e.g. place senior centres next to children’s parks or schools.)
- More “natural” playground i.e. climbing trees access to rocky areas.
- Replanting native species and removal of invasive species
- Conservation of natural areas (i.e. flowers / trees etc Birds, Animals)
- Keep commercialization out
- Interpretive sign
- More access to parks for seniors and disabled
- More tourist involvement in parks
- More community use / special events respectful of natural components
- More reflective of demographic of City of Victoria more eco-friendly parks
- Recognition of global warming
- Water stewardship and utilization
- Street block events (e.g. cherry blossom festival, garage sale, BBQs)
- Traffic calming
- More parks
- More recreational opportunities
- More walkways for pedestrians – aesthetically pleasing
- No vehicles in parks to reduce polluting exhausts
- Introduce goal of a certain quantity of open green spaces per population
- Far less commercial advertising on sidewalks
- No sharing of pedestrian walkways with bicycles
- More benches to rest on
- Carefully manage development to retain green space
- Clean water and park spaces
- Ensure mobility challenged access

Obstacles to accessing parks / public open spaces:

- Lack of sidewalks and curb cuts in parks to negotiate with wheelchairs and strollers.
- Too many cars on greenways.
- Not enough safe cross walks across Dallas Road
- Unsavory characters (drug and alcohol use)
- Better Bike access through the Downtown Core to get to the Galloping Goose.
- More cross walks are sorely needed along Dallas Road in James Bay, especially at the bottom of Government and South Turner.

- Dallas Walkway – alternate pathway to accommodate children and families on bikes and scooters.
- New development being built on areas that were perceived to be public spaces (e.g. Humboldt street, space in James Bay by the Wharf)
- Poorly planned trails and pathways (e.g. Beacon Hill – accessible to native plants without destroying them.)

Ideas for acquiring new parks or enhancing existing ones:

- Common gardens at the corner of Menzies and Michigan should not close
- Restoration of waterways
- Restoration of native flora & remove invasive species
- Interpretive, interactive displays
- Nature centre
- Educational opportunity for local schools and children – adults and visitors too.
- More pedestrian /bike friendly greenways
- Linear trails connecting neighbourhoods and public transport
- To raise money have a voluntary addition to our property taxes to be used for park maintenance and acquiring more park land. Voluntary tax: invite people to add \$20 / \$100 to the their property tax – make tax deductible
- Encourage wealthy people to leave \$ in their wills to be used to increase parks and maintain those parks already in existence.
- Support the preservation and enhancement of natural eco-systems within our green spaces
- Create interpretive and interactive opportunities for children and visitors
- Daylighting creeks and streams
- Poor Government parking affects James Bay. Instead of street level parking park/green space and parking underneath a park.
- More play lots closer to downtown – Harris green
- Public open spaces/parks close to new high-rise developments
- Naturalized play species for children – not just playground equipment
- Increase opportunities to grow food
- Underground parking with parks on top
- Green building design with rooftop gardens
- Need to create parks where everyone is included - including street people and homeless.
- Take on something and do it well.
- Tree lined boulevards with heritage homes, great sidewalks, views of home garden makes one feel the area is in a park like setting.
- Organize garbage pick-up during walks – e.g. senior groups
- Dallas better used by increasing cycling and pedestrian friendly areas
- Make pathways for exercise along perimeters of parks
- Keep beck more naturalized
- Get rid of the broom and other invasive non native species

- Children's playgrounds and community gardens should be designed together
- Create an outdoor classroom – cobs or green designed for public and kids to use.
- School space should always be kept as green space / Park.
- Encourage public use of rooftops
- Reduce roadways for greenways
- Protect parks in perpetuity
- Land swaps for park land by City of Victoria improved pedestrian signage and arteries to parks
