





Starting a small-scale urban food production business in the City of Victoria

Small-scale urban food production businesses play an important role in improving community access to healthy and local food and providing local economic opportunities. To successfully start and manage an urban food production business here are a few things you need to consider.

1) Learn about what you can produce

Small-scale commercial urban food production includes raw, unprocessed fruits and vegetables, mushrooms, flowers, seeds, nuts, herbs, seedlings, plant cuttings, eggs and honey. Review the Small-Scale Commercial Urban Food Production Handbook at victoria.ca/foodproduction to learn about what you need to know and think about before getting started.

2) Decide where you want to sell your products

Products can be sold at a food stand in the front yard of the property where they are produced. If the zoning allows, it may also be possible to sell products in an on-site restaurant, shop or other food related business. Products can also be sold off-site at farmers markets, restaurants, grocery stores, and other approved commercial outlets.

3) Find a site

Urban food production is permitted in all City zones. You do not have to live on the site where urban food production takes place. Sites can include vacant lots, rooftops, and residential yards.

4) Determine if you need a permit for your structure

Urban food production activities can involve the building, modification or maintenance of infrastructure such as greenhouses, walk-in coolers, root cellars, tool sheds, covered areas or, coops. Depending on your project, you may need to apply for a building, plumbing, electrical, sign or development permit. Food stands are permitted for on-site sales. A business licence must be obtained and regulations apply.

5) Apply for a business licence

To sell your products on-site, you must obtain an annual business licence for \$100, or a 3-month business licence for \$25.

To sell your products off-site, you need to obtain an annual business licence for \$100.

Frequently Asked Questions

- 1. Is my business located in the City of Victoria?
 - a. Greater Victoria is comprised
 of 13 municipalities. Use the City
 of Victoria's VicMap tool to determine
 if your business location is in the
 City of Victoria at victoria.ca/map.
- 2. What do I need to apply for an urban food production business licence?
 - a. Read the City's Small-Scale
 Commercial Urban Food Production
 Handbook to determine if you need
 approval from Island Health to sell
 your products.
 - b. Comply with applicable zoning regulations.
 - Sketches, photographs and a site plan for any structures (greenhouses, sheds, other) associated with the business. Obtain permits if applicable. Food stands of allowed dimensions do not require a building permit.
- 3. What if I want to sell something other than raw, unprocessed fruits and vegetables, mushrooms, flowers, seeds, nuts, herbs, seedlings, plant cuttings, eggs and honey?
 - a. Your business does not fall in the small-scale commercial urban food production category. Contact the Business Hub at bizhub@victoria.ca or 250.361.0629 to help determine your needs and identify next steps.
